"The Cotillion dance had a great feel to it!" sophomore Rachel Petik said.




The runners were not the only recipients of honors this season. Coach Neels was recognized as the All-Region Coach of the Year in his first year as head coach.




"We will never forget Nick Castner trying to shoot a three point shot between his legs, and everyone sneezing on eachother!" senior Chase Frerichs said.




Raider Wrestlers Dominate the Mat



Coach Ganser Said, "I'm satisfied with the way we wrestled this season and then came out 6th at districts after having finished 10th the year before."





"Arguing the case is the best part," Bond said. Wirth added, "It's the great memories

























