The Maroons opened the 1950 track season with a duel meet with Kimball. The team proved to be better on the track than in the field. Scoring first place in both sprints was Kenneth Dimick, the 880 was won by George Barlow, the 440 by Don Sabin, the pole vault by Dale Buehrer, and Harden and Montgomery were first and second in the high jump. Sidney took the meet with very little difficulty.

Barlow and Dimick gained recognition in the annual Sidney invitational. In a very close finish, Barlow dived for the tape, and won the 880 yard run at the sacrifice of minor cuts and bruises as he slide across the finish line.

Dimick, whose hidden potentialities were exerted in the dashes and sprints, gained the title of the best sprinter in the state, and broke all old records in the 100 and 220 yard dashes.

The highlights of the Western Nebraska track meet held at Scottsbluff featured the fast-stepping Sidney mile relay team consisting of starter, Dale Buehrer, who handed off to Ronald Ovendon. The baton was then passed to Bill Bolz and carried to anchor man, Don Sabin. Don brought it across the finish line. Don was the fastest man on the team and ran with a great amount of ease and unvarying speed.

However, none of the boys were in trouble during the entire race, and they came through with a easy margin of 20 to 25 yards. Since that was the first time it had been run, the record belongs to Sidney.


## 1950 TRACK

John Harden had a very lucky day at the same meet by setting a new high jump record of $5^{\prime} 111 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ which was previously $5^{\prime} 10^{\prime \prime}$. He also broke his own school record which was $5^{\prime}$ $83 / 4^{\prime \prime}$.

Sidney qualified ten boys for the state track meet at the qualifing meet held at Bayard. They were edged out of first place at this meet by Mitchell who was exceedingly good on the track.

The Maroons got two first places at the state meet in Lincoln with Harden in the high jump and Buehrer, Bolz, Ovendon, and Sabin the mile relay. The team also placed in the 100 and 220 yard dashes with Dimick, Montgomery tied for second in the high jump; and Buehrer in the low hurdle race.

Many were the congratulations to Coach Leo Shuman whose track team in every meet of 1950 season in most track and field events was a major threat to the leading athletes of the state.
