





Backing up plans for improvement and building is the policy making group for the Sidney school system. The members of this hardworking group are A. O. Olson, vice-president; Ray L. Jones; A. E. Wright, president; Superintendent, O. J. Weymouth; Dr. Hull Cook; K. S. Agnew, secretary; and Mrs. B. H. Grimm.



Keeping the office running smoothly is the job undertaken by Margaret Preble, the Sidney High office girl. She also, as treasurer, has charge of all the school funds. When Sidney assumed the title of Oil and Wheat Capital of Nebraska it did more than swell the traffic down main street and create a housing shortage; it created an education facility shortage. With an in crease of 632 students since 1949 and large grade school classes coming up, the Sidney Board of educa tion and the Superintendent of Schools, O. J. Wey mouth, saw the necessity of improving our schools and building new ones to add to the former four school system. They spent hours of planning how to finance the projects, approving architectural blueprints, and answering questions of the laypeople on ways to raise the money.

Building and adding on to schools have helped minimize the crowded conditions that existed. The grade schools have received much needed attention by the addition of a new \$276,000 Central School and the building of a \$300,000 South School to accomodate more grade school students. A sum ot \$75,000 was used to add rooms to the North Ward School. Plans are now underway for a new \$450,000 junior high building to be erected just east of the senior high building.

With the increase of students comes the need of at least six more teachers to teach next year in the lower grades. O. J. Weymouth, superintendent, surveys the proposed blueprints for the new Junior High building and thinks of the future when it will be finished. Mr. Weymouth completed his education after receiving his AB degree from Chadron State Teachers College and an MA degree from Colorado State College of Education. He finished with graduate work from the University of Nebraska. For relaxation he enjoys fishing, reading, and farming for fun.





Being principal of Sidney High is the fulltime job of Albert E. Nimtz, but still he always finds time to listen to any of the students' problems. Mr. Nimtz attended the University of lowa and received his AB and MA degrees. As President of Sidney High Mr. Nimtz finds himself sponsor of the President's Cabinet. The time out from his many and varied duties Mr. Nimtz devotes to his favorite hobbies of fishing and bridge.


Living in a scientific world makes it necessary for each person to know and understand science more thoroughly. This vast field is open to anyone who feels a need to help improve the world through science.









"LOOK WHAT WE'VE DONE!"





The entertaining jug and bottle band was one of the numerous groups that performed this year. It provided an interesting source of amusement for members as well as listeners.






Bridgeport fell in a thriller on a Friday and the Maroons repeated on Holdrege the next night.
