




We Are Educated for Better Living

Hats Off to Mr. Weymouth

Superintendent O. J. Weymouth was given recognition for his thirty-three years of devoted service to the Sidney Public Schools on the night of October 3 when the High School Band applauded him during the halftime of the Sidney-Kimball game. In tribute, the band first formed Mr. Weymouth's initials, O. J. W., as they played the high school theme song. As the crowd and Mr. Weymouth watched, the band next outlined the dates 1925, 1926 and 1944, representing first the date of Mr. Weymouth's arrival as a teacher in Sidney, the second as the date when he became a coach, and 1944, the date when he was promoted to superintendent of the Sidney Schools.

Before presenting Mr. Weymouth to the audience, the Band formed the word, "Pidge," the nickname by which he is affectionately known to his friends, as the lively strains of "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow" went out over the air.






"Parent's Back to School Night" brings our parents and faculty together so that they, working together, may guide us into a better education and way of life.




About Our School

Strives to Make the "Best Better"




The House rises to its feet as Legislator Ronnie Zalesky escorts President Mel Everingham and Senator Dale Black from the installation services.

Getting off to a good start in the basketball season, Sidney defeated North Platte by a technical decision.




