## SCHOOL SYSTEM IS EXPANDING

School enrollments have steadily been climbing; for this reason Sidney is looking forward to the completion of a new junior high building, located on the park grounds of the senior high building.

Enrollment for the new school will be between 400 and 425 students. These will include the seventh, eighth, and ninth grades.

The new building will consist of 15 classrooms, an auditorium with a maximum seating capacity of 2000 persons, a cafeteria, a large and spacious band room, and several offices.

Both the high school and the junior high will operate together starting next fall in that some junior high classes will be held in the senior high building and vice versa.

## ELECTION HIGH-LIGHTS STUDENT GOVERNMENT

Fall is election time at Sidney High School, and this year found students, as well as faculty members, enthusiastically participating in the busy round of political activities. Highlights of the 1954 election campaign included many posters adorning the walls of SHS, campaign speeches, a dance sponsored by the Independents and crashed by the Progressive Pep Band, arm bands worn by the Progressives during the primary election, and a number of party conventions. Credit for this fine campaign and election should go to Mr. Crouse, the faculty sponsor; Charlene Anthony, 1954 Girls' Stater; and Tom Gilliland, 1954 Boys' Stater.

Student-teacher government as we now have it was first instituted in Sidney High School in 1940 with the combined efforts of Mr. Weymouth, present Superintendent of Schools, and Miss

Bess Shires, who at that time was an instructor of English at SHS. This form of government, stressing student participation, was patterned after that of the United States government.

The students, who are considered as the citizens of SHS, are organized into two major political parties, the Independent and the Progressive, capably headed this year by Mike Frost and Tom Gilliland, respectively. Election time found candidates of both parties carrying on vigorous and spirited campaigns.

Each of the four classes is divided into eight legislative districts and one student from each of these districts is elected to the state unicameral legislature on a non-partisan ticket. A governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, and secretary of treasury are also elected to conduct the official business of each state.

The executive department is presided over by the President, Principal Albert E. Nimtz. The cabinet members are chosen by the President and approved by the Senate. These officers and their duties are as follows:

Secretary of State, Ivan Adams, organizes relations between the various states and other schools.
Secretary of Treasury, Margaret Preble, takes care of the school accounts.
Secretary of Interior, Tom Gilliland, has charge of the programs and assemblies.

Secretary of Activities, Marcella Lessman, whose duty is to be in charge of ticket sales at games.
Secretary of Personnel, Deanna Moseman, promotes good relationships between students and organizes the care of the building.
Secretary of Agriculture, Lloyd Brauer, has charge of the improvement of the campus.

Closely paralleling the nation's lower congressional body is the SHS House of Representatives. One student from each of the four congressional districts in the individual states is elected to serve in this highly responsible body. Jane Foudray was chosen by her fellow members of the group to preside over them as the Speaker of the House.
Mabel Nielsen, Vice President of Sidney High School, is the presiding officer of the Senate, which is composed of one instructor elected from each of the four states. This body discusses the bills and suggestions passed in the House of Representatives.

The members of the school board and the Superintendent of Schools, Orrin J. Weymouth, in the capacity of Justices of the Supreme Court, act as the final authority on all matters brought to their consideration.

Thus through participation in a democratic form of government, Sidney High School students gain a knowledge and appreciation which will be valuable to them and their country throughout their entire lives.

## FRESHMAN ENROLLMENT LARGEST IN HISTORY OF SHS

While roaming through the halls of SHS those first sweltering days of the school term, the most apparent change to be noted in the system was the addition of people - people who for the most part were freshmen. In fact the class showed an increase of 28 when the enrollment totaled 129 against the 101 of last year.
To be sure such a large class would be expected to make a worth-while contribution in the way of entertainment to the upperclassmen and school. Their sponsors saw to it that such was the case when they carefully planned and directed a literary pantomime which the freshmen enacted with a fine feeling for color and effect. The costumes were colorful and quite authentic. The pantomime, however, did not provide laughs for the crowd as did the limberger cheese and services rendered with protest by the helpless beginners. The day of fun was climaxed with the dance given the new class by the seniors.
A constitutional committee composed of Rosalie Swanson, Judith Townsend, Valdene Boese and Kay Thomas presented for ratification the freshman constitution at a class meeting held early in the fall.
The first legislative meeting held November 23 found a bill for three dollars awaiting class action and also a demand for a class dance. The dance committee found the only opening to be in March. Of course the question of dues came up and was settled when the customary fifty cents per semester was again considered the price a class member in good standing must contribute to maintain his position.
A few adventurous freshmen attended the Christmas Cotillion to find the upperclasimen did not hold a monopoly on "good time".
Class members were active in chorus, Pep Club, sports and other extra-curricular organizations. Freddie Frahm and Jack Schilling won prizes with their exhibits during Oil Progress Week. Bill was given a high rating in the state soil judging contest and Stanley won first place in local soil judging. As a team the two netted fourth place in the state grain judging contest held in Ogallala.

As outstanding athletes of the class Roberta Thorpe and Darlene Jezek were acclaimed in G.A.A.

The Ninth Grade football fans predicted there would be some varsity backs from a group which included Jim Irwin, Dean Osborn, Ronnie Gilbreath and Gary Koran, Michael Baeckel, Michael Manuel, Joe Butler and Glen Wilkins showed promise for linemen positions. Sidney again ran down another opponent, as they made a good showing in their homecoming game with the Mitchell Tigers. The Maroons outplayed the heavier Mitchell team in every

The McCook Bisons stopped Sidney on October 22 with a strong passing attack. Sidney lost
the hard-fought game, 14-12.
Up next on the schedule for the Maroons were the North Platte Bulldogs, ranked fifth among class "A" schools in Nebraska. They outweighed Sidney an average of 21 pounds per player. The final score in the game was $27-6$ in favor of the Bulldogs. This loss gave Sidney a four-won, four-lost record.

Going all the way to Columbus to play a see-saw battle with St. Bonaventure, Sidney was again troubled with "fumblitis", as St. Bonaventure capitalized on a Sidney fumble late in the game, winning, 18-12.
