



ALBERT E. NIMTZ was born near Bloomer, Wisconsin. He attended school in the Bloomer Grade Schools, and a boarding school at Clinton, Iowa, where he took an active part in sports, especially basketball, during his high school years. Interested in teaching, Mr. Nimtz enrolled in the University of Iowa where he majored in secondary education and received both B.A. and M.A. degrees.

Following graduation he began his career as an educator, first teaching in Iowa schools and coming to Nebraska in 1935 when he became principal of Crawford High School for four years and then superintendent of the Hemingford Schools for seven years. Eleven years ago he came to Sidney as high school principal. Two years ago he was promoted to assistant superintendent of schools, but when Mr. Casey left last year, he again assumed the responsibilities of principal.

In his eleven years at SHS, he served as guidance director for eight years, organized teacher workshops each fall, and created and took charge of the adult education classes. When the new junior high school was built he set up the curriculum for the Senior and Junior High Schools and synchronized the two programs.

Because he is a firm believer in the educational value of speech and dramatics classes as essential to self-expression, Mr. Nimtz has given due place for them in the school's curriculum. In addition he helped organize and set up the music department which includes the band and chorus, and assisted in the organization of the Sidney Chapter of the National Honor Society.

At present Principal Nimtz assumes charge of the audio-visual equipment, sets up the activities calendar for the year, takes charge of all money from all organizations, organizes all athletics, and is adviser to teachers and students along with his other administrative duties.



In this school of ours we enriched our lives. We entered as eager and expectant freshmen and left just as eager for life as seniors on graduation day.



Custodians Offer Indispensable Service


Blackboards are washed, halls are swept, and lawns are kept looking spruce by Sidney High School's custodians. Without their services, our school would not have such a good appearance.



Even though science courses, especially chemistry and physics are considered difficult, Leslie Burke, Jim Irwin, and Sandra Lewis find the experiments especially interesting.



Inside the building you found practiced, a type of government not found in very many schools in the United States, a school government erected and functioning in exact likeness to our governments in Washington and Lincoln.

Posters of brightly colored paints were hanging on the walls admonishing the student body to "Vote Independent!" or "Hail the Progressives!"

In the American history room there was a teacher named Carl Crouse, in the gym a boy named Don Schmidt, Independent party chairman, and in the halls, a girl named Kathy Sieckmann, chairman of the Progressive party, whose sole purpose for being seemed to be in giving the students the added boost and support which makes this school a democratic one.





The Sidney High School band started their memorable year by attending University of Nebraska Band Day, and marching at home football games. The big event of the year was the trip to Washington, D.C., to march in President Eisenhower's Inaugural Parade.

As soon as Mr. Hinn told the band that they had been officially invited everyone got excited, then he said there were no funds. In fact he told them there wasn't any money even in the state parade committee treasury. That didn't stop the band. An intense fund raising drive followed. The band went to Cheyenne and appeared on television, and played at the radiothon to raise funds. Finally with the help of the Chamber of Commerce, the Band Auxiliary, and other civic organizations and individual contributions, necessary funds were raised.

The big day finally arrived and along with fifty-five adults, the band left Thursday, January 17, via Union Pacific train. With them on the train they had besides the four sponsors, Mrs. Olson, Mrs. Hinn, and Mr. and Mrs. Hinrichs, their own doctor, nurse, instrument repair man, and radio announcer. On the way the band had a layover in Chicago so they took a tour of the city and saw the points of interest.

Monday, January 21, band members had the thrill of their lives when they got to march in the big parade. Tuesday was the day of the big tour. Points of interest the band visited included the White House, the Capitol, where they saw the Senate and the House of Representatives in session, the Smithsonian Institute, Mount Vernon, the Bureau of Printing and Engraving, the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, with the changing of the guard, the Marine Corps War Memorial of the landing at Iwo Jima, and the Archives Building. The original Constitution and Declaration of Independence, sacred to all Americans, were viewed with reverence.

Tuesday evening the weary group boarded the train for home. They arrived, tired but happy, Thursday, January 24, after an unforgettable week.

The next band activity was the annual Mid-Winter Concert which was held March 3, and featured the cornet trio, Duane Moody, Ted Baker, and Don Johnson. Many ensembles and solos besides the band, performed at district music contest which was held in Sidney in April.

The band also made community appearances at the underpass dedication, the armory dedication, and graduation.

They Say It With Music



Coach Art Bauer with one of the heaviest squads in his six years at Sidney guided the 1956 Maroons through a winning season. Three of these wins were over traditional foes from the Western Conference which gave Sidney the championship of the newly formed conference.

For their first game, September 14, the Maroons traveled to Alliance where they got the season off to a good start as they rolled over the Bulldogs 37-0.

The Curtis Aggies provided the opponent for the first home game and were taken in tow 21-6 as the result of three first-half touchdowns.

Scottsbluff spoiled their fun as the Bearcats handed the Maroons their first loss of the season, 13-6 on the Bearcat's home field.

Homecoming, October 5, with all its color and excitement seemed more successful than ever especially since the Maroons rolled over the Kimball Longhorns 54-7.

A winning score of 36-0 was the result of fast team work when Sidney met the Gering Bulldogs on the Gering field for their second conference game.

The Ogallala Indians invaded Sidney to decide the conference championship and the result was one of the best football games of the season. Even though the Maroons held a 2 touchdown lead in the final quarter the outcome of the game was never certain until the final gun sounded and the Maroons, after putting up two tremendous goal line stands, had a 27-15 victory and the Western Conference Championship.

The Maroons met McCook on the Bison's home field and when the long, wet, mud soaked evening was over the Maroons had suffered their first shutout of the season, 16-0.

Sidney went down in defeat to North Platte 21-19 and to York 13-12 as the season closed, November 9.




Memories of '56 Football Are Good

A fumble of the opposing team provides an opportunity for the Sidney team to recover the ball, cheered on by proud parents, screaming girls, and the people next door.






Coach Harris outlines a play pattern to his players that should result in two points.


Besides sports, this class of '59 demonstrated their abilities in other organizations such as band, pep club, "S" club, and Masque and Gavel in addition to the scholastic field.


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


