## SIDNEY HIGH FOOTBALL RESERVES

Showing a good amount of spirit, the 1949 Sidney High football reserves swept aside all opposition to sport a title of undefeated for the season. In the last five years, Reserve Coach Ray Maley's teams have won eighteen games, lost three and tied one for a winning percentage of 857 .

The season was opened against Sterling on the Sidney field and the Maroon Reserves took a 20-0 decision. McWilliams, Bolz, and Smith scored T.D.'s while Smith and Bolz added extra points. The second game was played at Julesburg. Sidney had a 14-0 half time lead but Julesburg outscored them in the second half $7-6$ bring a final count of 20-7 in our favor. Sidney traveled to Kimball for the next encounter and although the Longhorn reserves put up a stiff battle, Sidney brought home the bacon to the tune of 18-0. Oshkosh came to Sidney for the final game. It was the first home night game to be played by the Sidney Reserves. They showed appreciation of the honor by playing their best ball of the year and won a $33-13$ victory.

The starting line was often: Adams, Wise, Sebold, Higgins, Tobler, King, Ziegler. The backfields were often switched with the Sophs-Bolz, Barlow, Smith, and McWilliams usually playing more minutes per game than the Frosh backs-Beebe, Glassburn, Maley, and Chappell. Others who earned their letters and did a lot to make the season a great success were: Allgood, Borcher, Amen, Benzel, Deeder, Gocha, P. Jewett, L. Jones, Livingston, L. Moore, Nissen, and Seevers. These sixteen Frosh and eleven Sophs brought to Sidney High the third undefeated football reserve team, the others being in 1945 and 1947. It was Maley's fifth undefeated Sidney team the other being Frosh track in 1947 and 1948.

The next game with Chappell threatened to be a repeat of the other one; but instead Sidney came out ahead 48 to 46 in a real thriller. The Maroons crushed Bridgeport 63 to 28. The Sidney ream was out to redeem themselves against Kimball. This time it was the Kimbal fans who went home disappointed as Sidney beat 41 to 35 . Ogallaia's faststepping team proved too much for the Maroons; and gave Sidney its only loss on the home-floor. The Mitchell game gave the Sidney fans a let-down feeling not because of Sidney's playing; but because of the disagreement between the referees and the officials. Sidney lost this one 47 to 43 in an overtime. Sidney had great hopes of achievement for the tournament; but they were not to be realized. The Maroons dropped their first game to the Minatare five 35 to $\mathbf{3 2}$. Sidney outscored their opponents 671 to 608

Visual Aids in 1950 is no longer the mystery it was in " 45 ". This class, offered to boys only because of the heavy equipment which has to be carried around, was originated so the boys could learn to operate the motion picture projectors, P.A. System, opaque projector, and other audio-visual aids equipment.

In this class, the boys learn to mix developers and fixers from raw chemicals. They also learn to develop their own films and make their own prints.
