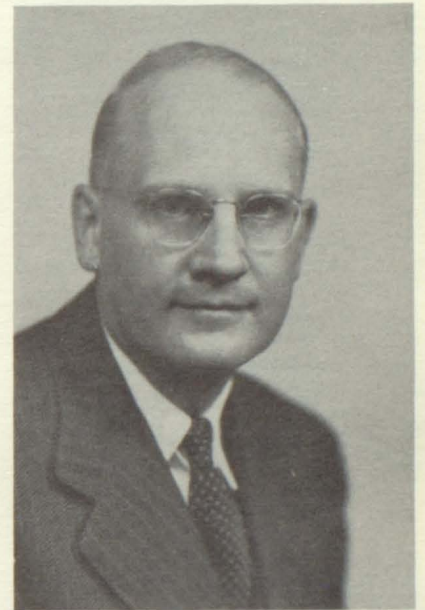
EXECUTIVES

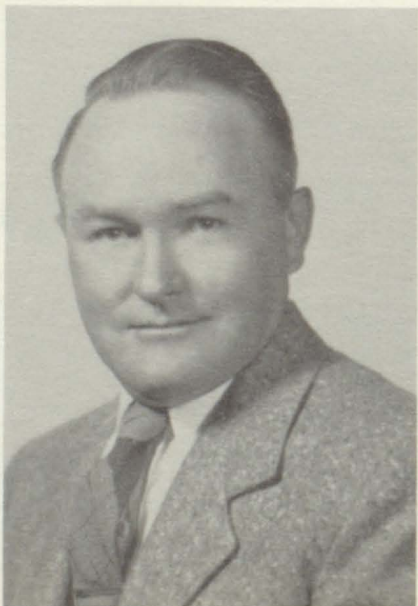

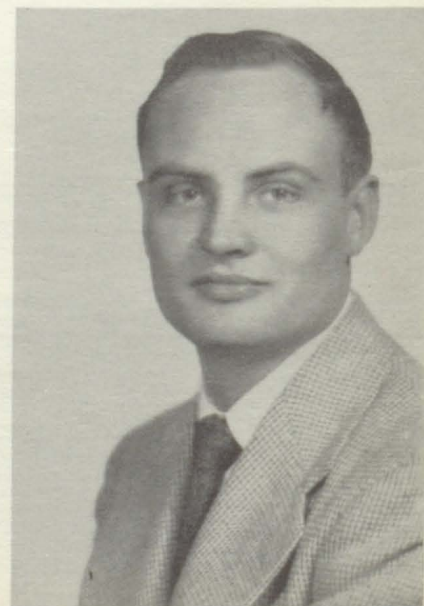
DARWIN DALZELL endeavored to teach his chemistry students how **not** to blow up the school. He also taught general science, general math, and was a sponsor for the freshman class.

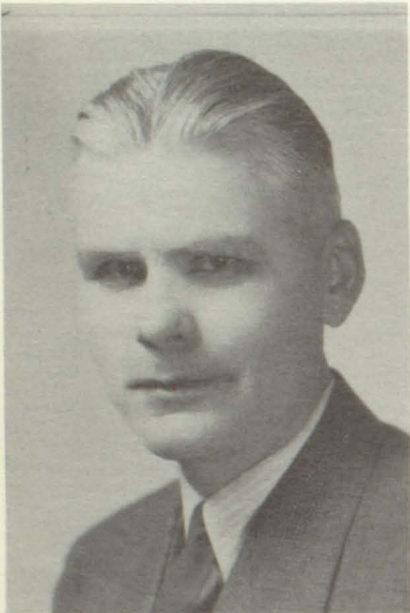

GOVERNMENT

The SHS student House of Representatives was patterned after this nation's lower congressional body and parallels it in most ways. This form of government was promoted by Mr. Weymouth during the year of 1939 when the entire governmental system at Sidney High School was changed to one like the system used to govern our country. It is sponsored by Miss Shires who serves as an adviser.

The national system and our school system are exactly alike with one exception. At SHS there are four districts in each state or class. The number of districts in each state does not change with a decrease or increase of voting citizens as is done in our national government.

Members of the House gain more experience and knowledge from their branch of government than pupils holding other governmental positions because the House of Representatives has the most responsibility in school government. Election competition is keener for the positions in the House than for any school office because the students elected are responsible for any change or addition in the school constitution which provides a set of rules under which all school citizens must abide. Any student fortunate enough to serve a year's term in the House of Representatives of SHS, gains superior knowledge useful to him as a future voting citizen of his country.

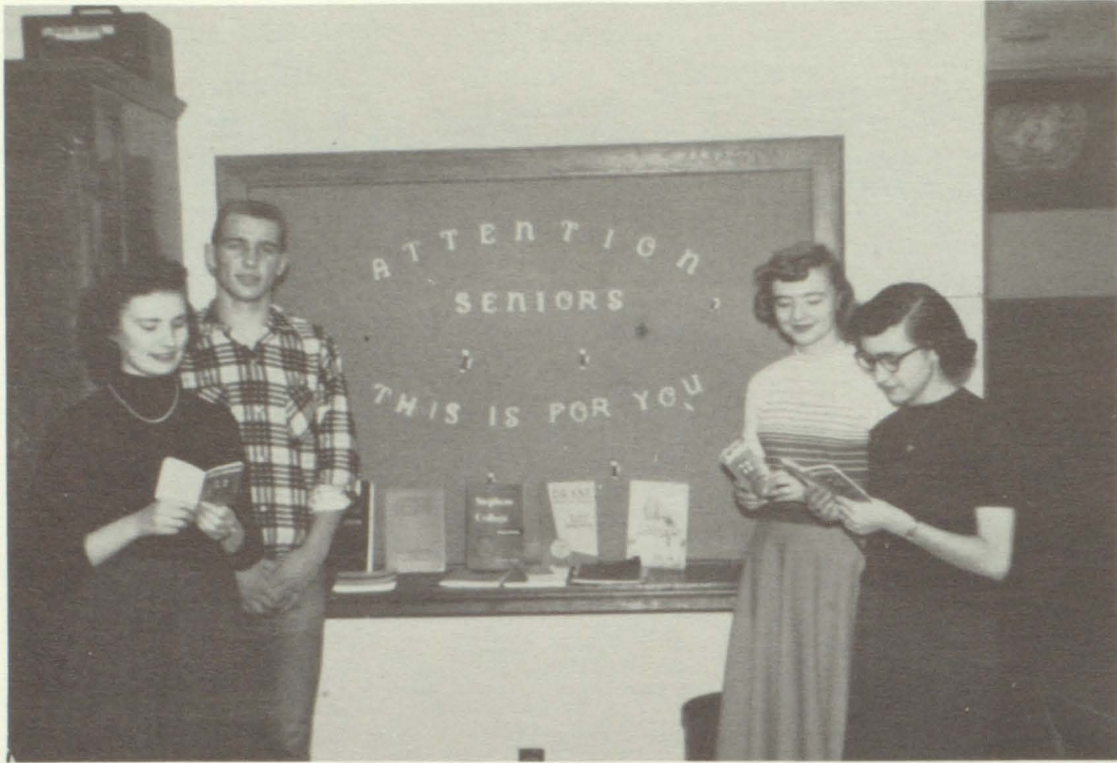

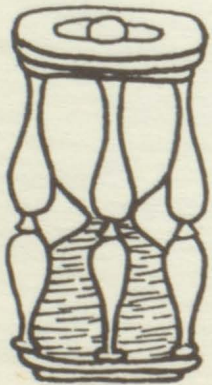

"Busy as bees," the old saying goes, and right they were, for the Juniors of 52-53 lived up to the record set by past Junior classes.

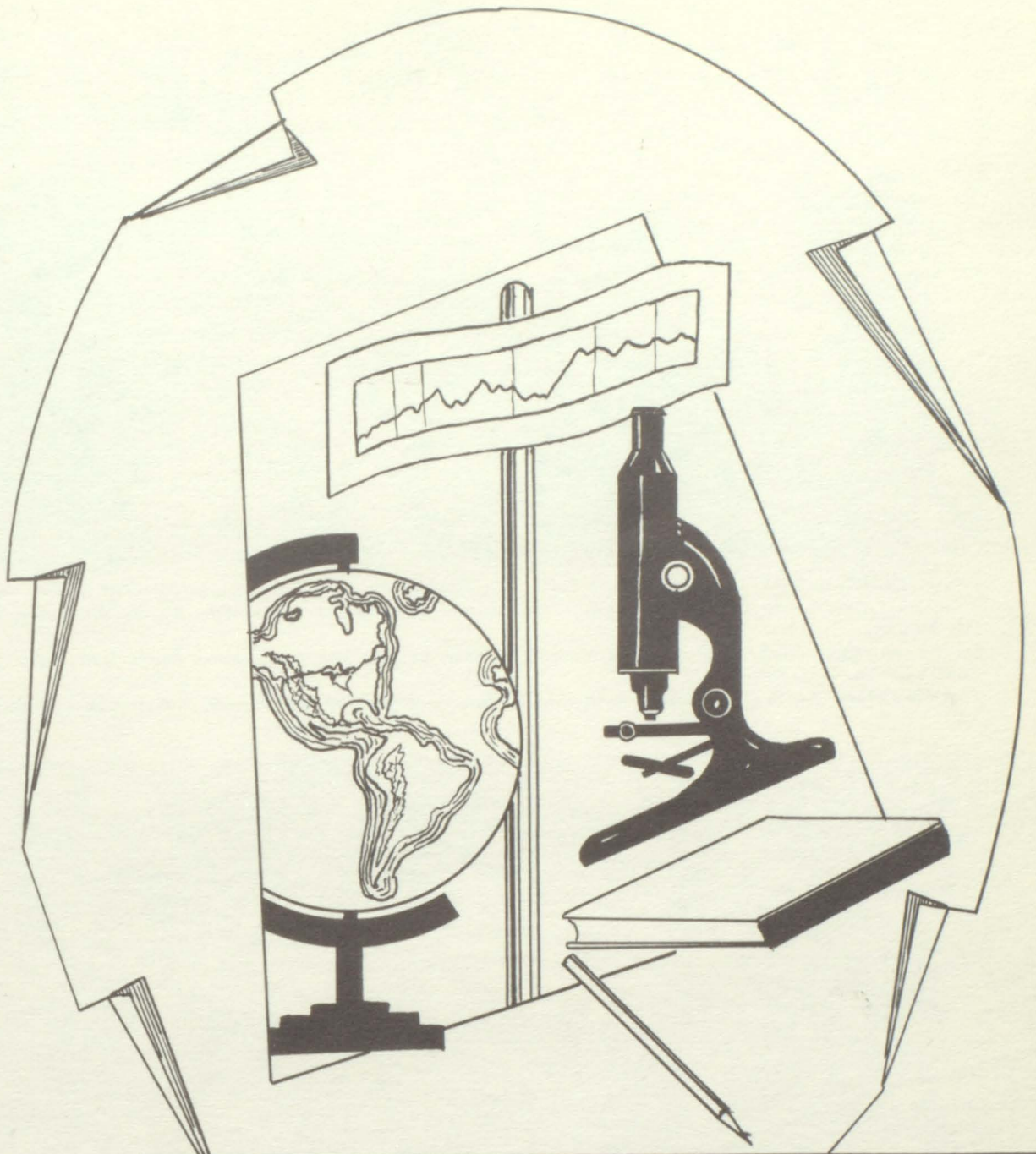

In November, the class presented their version of the annual Junior Class Play, entitled, "The Little Dog Laughed."

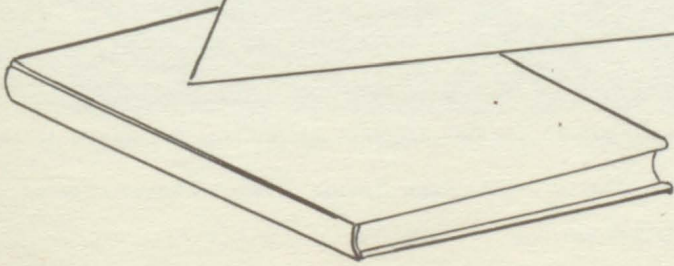
Then came the big day at the court house when the Juniors from SHS along with the other Juniors from Cheyenne County got together to find out more about their county government on County Government Day.

Getting off to a good start the Maroons beat a highly rated Alliance eleven, 12 to 0. Beebe scored both TD's.

Next the Maroons crushed Bridgeport 40 to 0. John Grove showed his heels to the Bulldogs on an 88 yard touchdown jaunt. The future prospects were dimmed with the loss of Carl Beebe because of injuries.

The Mitchell Tigers were the next victims of the Sidney Maroons. On their home field for the first time they spanked the Tigers to the tune of 32 to 7.

The Omaha Holy Name Team proved too much for the Maroons by a 0 to 19-score.

The enthusiasm was somewhat raised as the Maroons trounced Gordon 59 to 7. Darrell Glassburn led the attack against the Broncs by scoring five touchdowns.

Then came the scalping of the Ogallala Indians. After the dust had risen the score was Sidney 27, Ogallala 6.

In front of Gregg McBride, Sidney overpowered Oshkosh 19 to 13.

Then came the meeting with the Gering Bulldogs. There were fans filling every available seat in the Gering stadium to see a game that might decide the conference championship. The fans saw a very hard fought game that ended in a deadlock, 6 to 6.

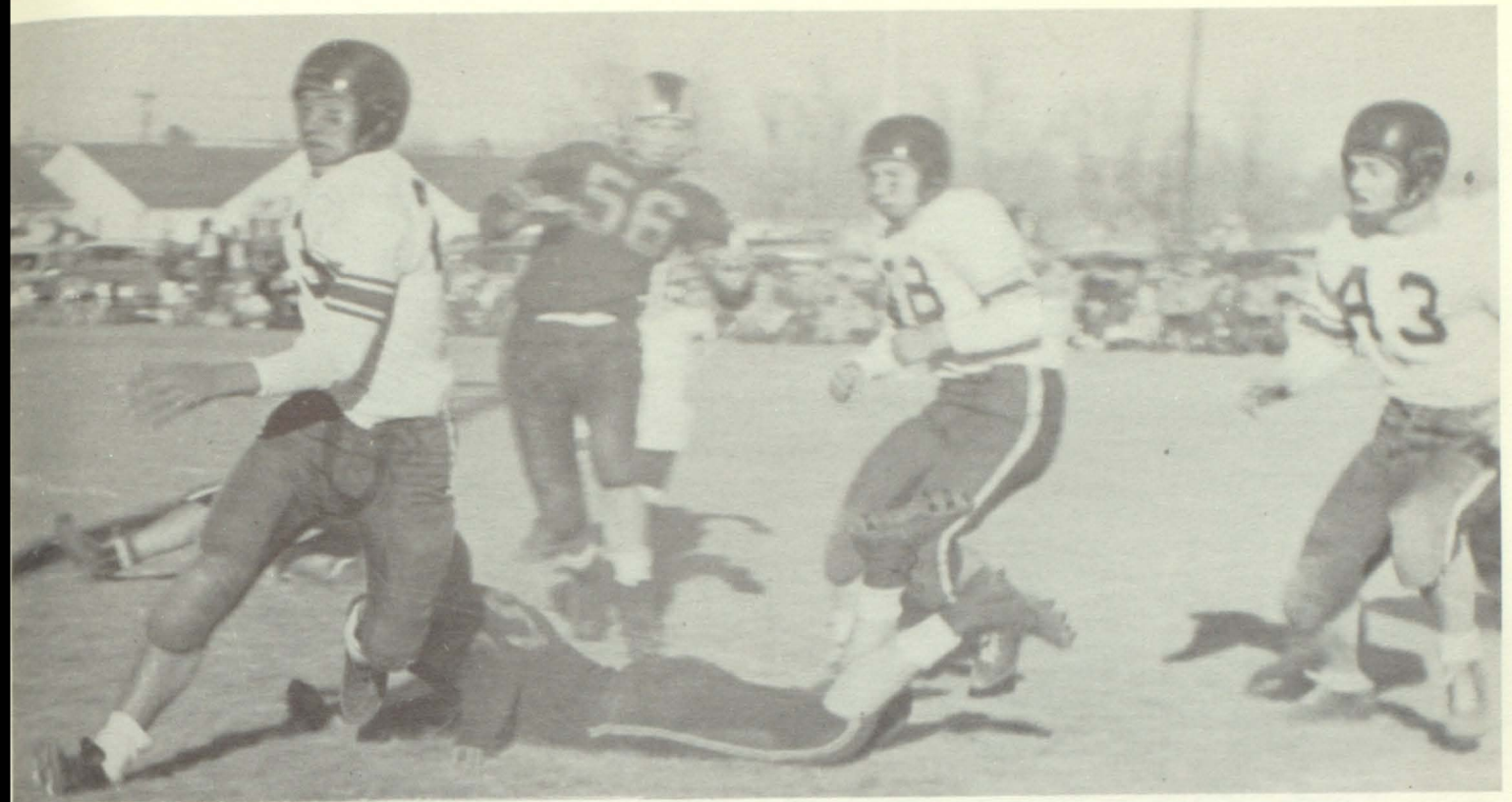
Chappell pulled an upset over the Maroons by a score of 15 to 6.

The Maroons went on to whip Kimball 32 to 6 to assure second place honors in the conference.

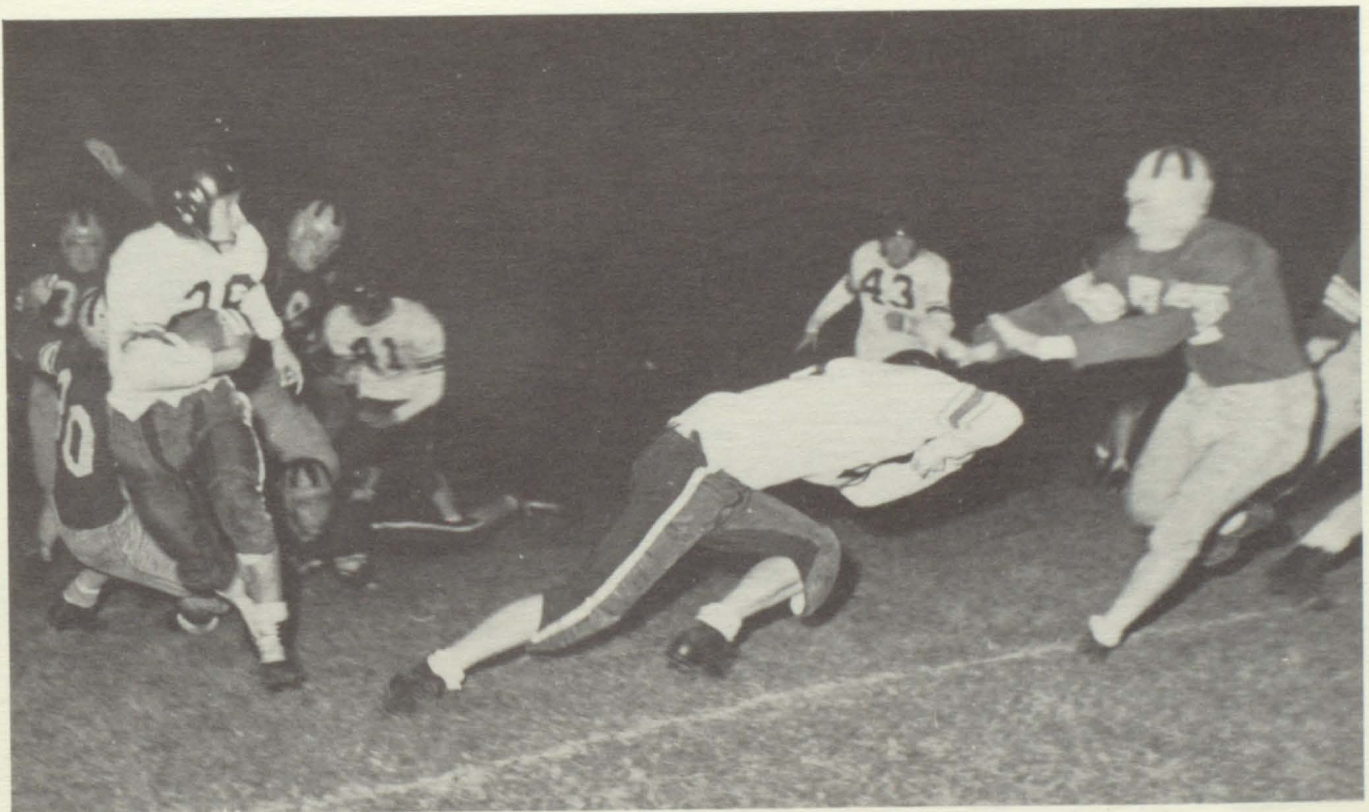
On the ground the Maroons rolled up a total of 2,823 yards with an average of 6.21 per carry. In total yards on the ground and passes, the Maroons totaled 3,385 yards to their opponents 1,791 yards.

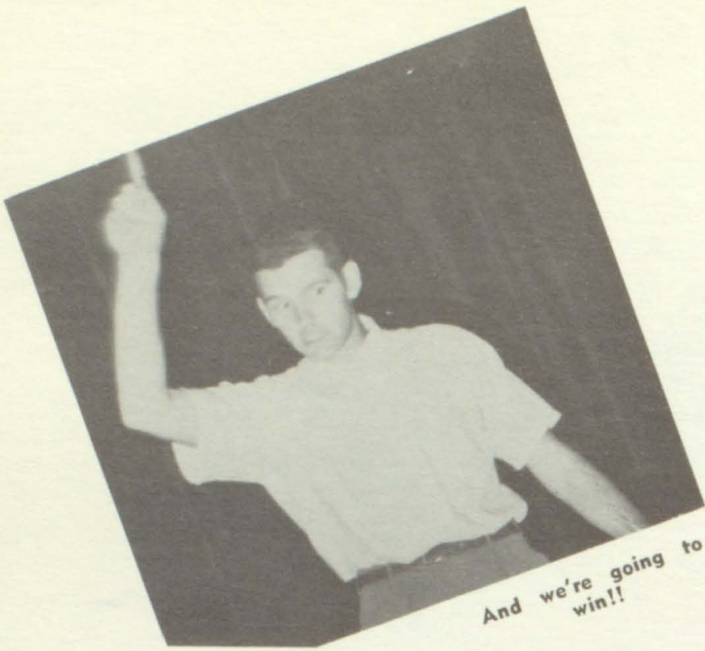

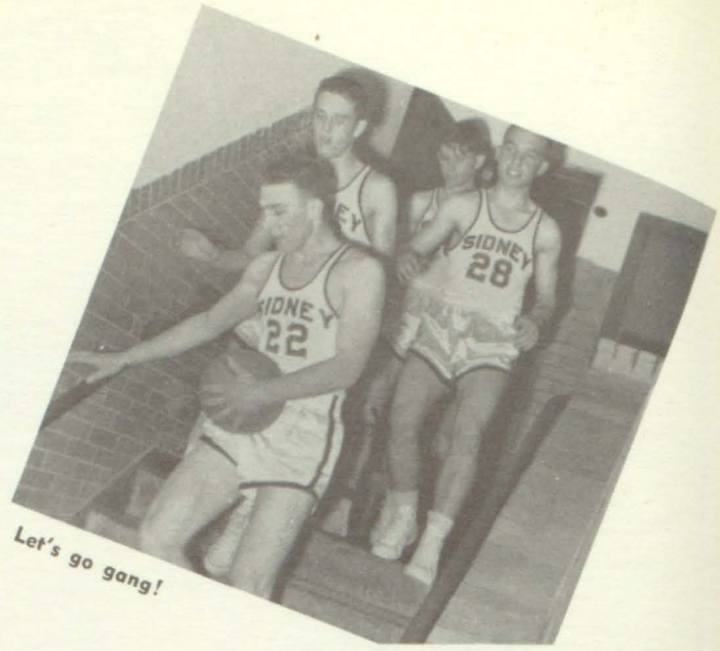

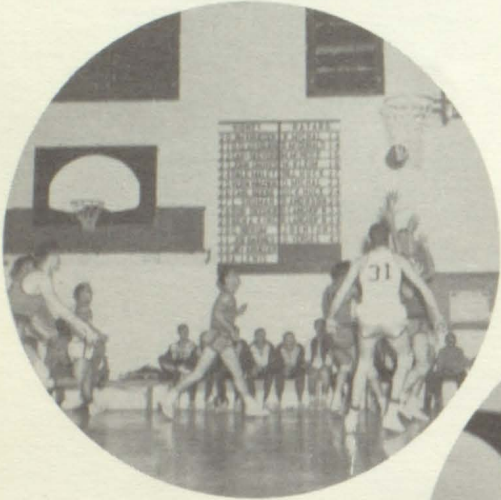

Lacking experience but showing a lot of determination the 2nd team has developed some very promising material for future Sidney High teams.

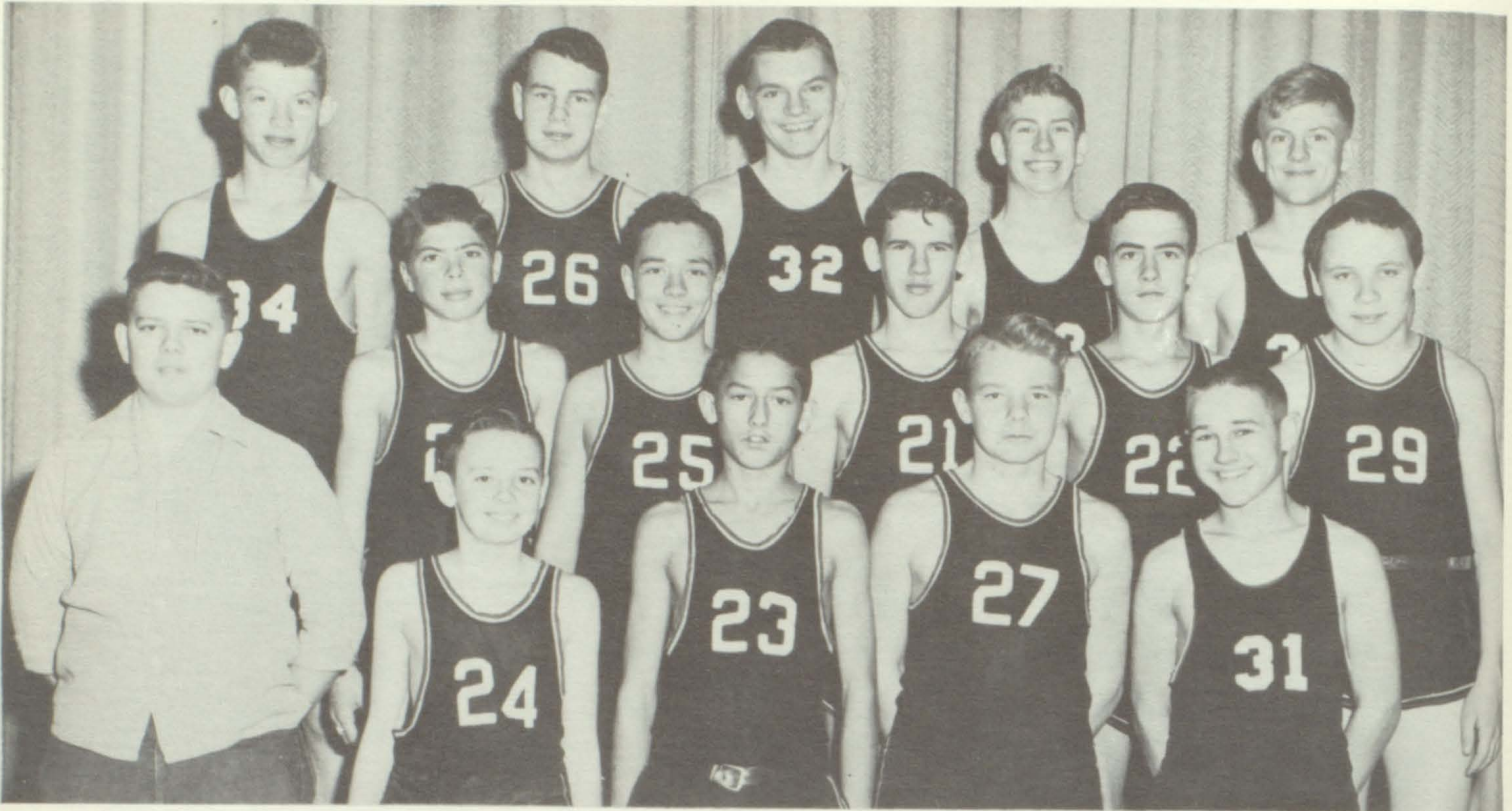

Coach Ackerson, taking over as Freshman Basketball Coach, came up with a very impressive team which brightens the hopes for future basketball glories for Sidney High School.

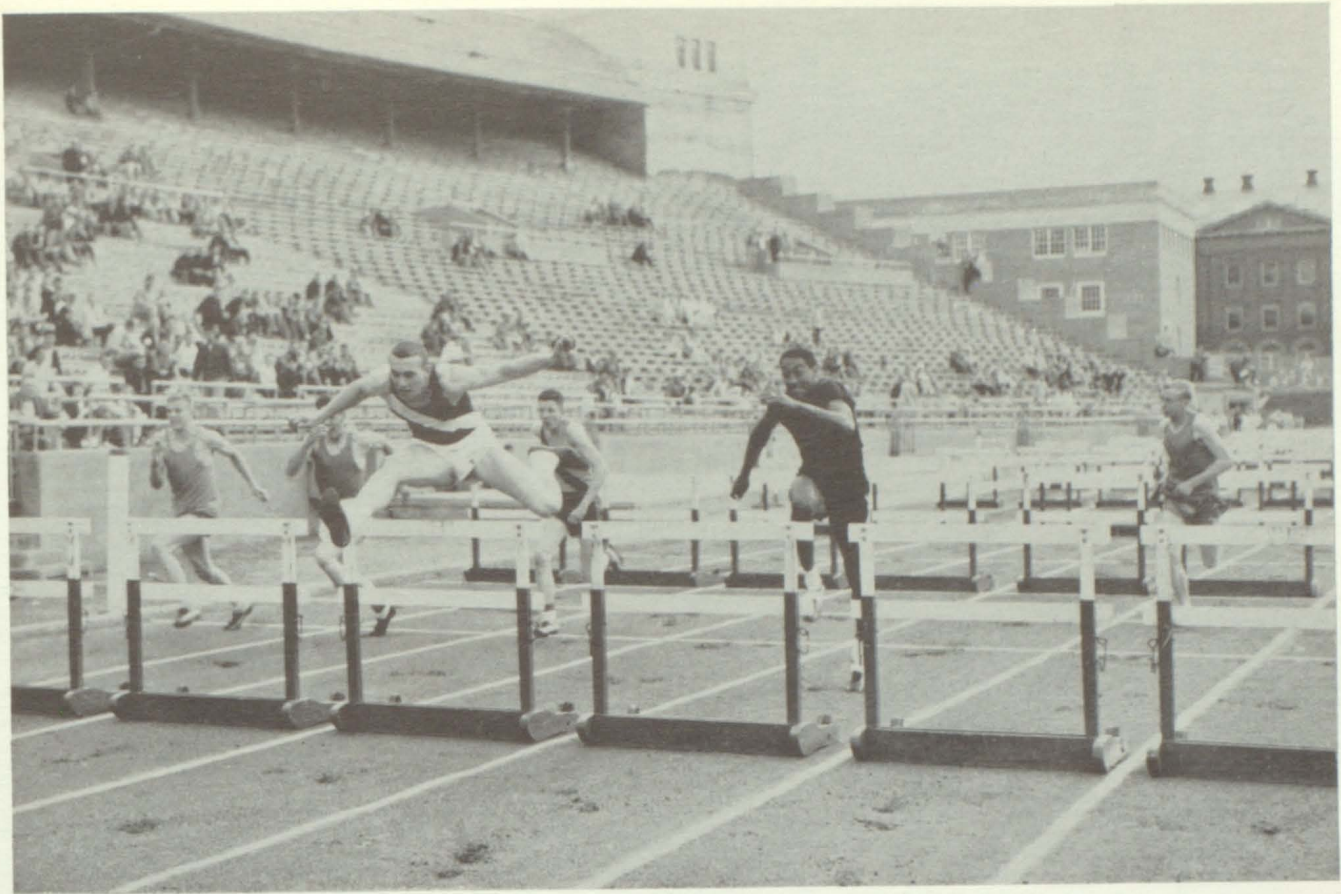

This season completed an eight year record for the Little Maroons with 78 victories and 29 losses.

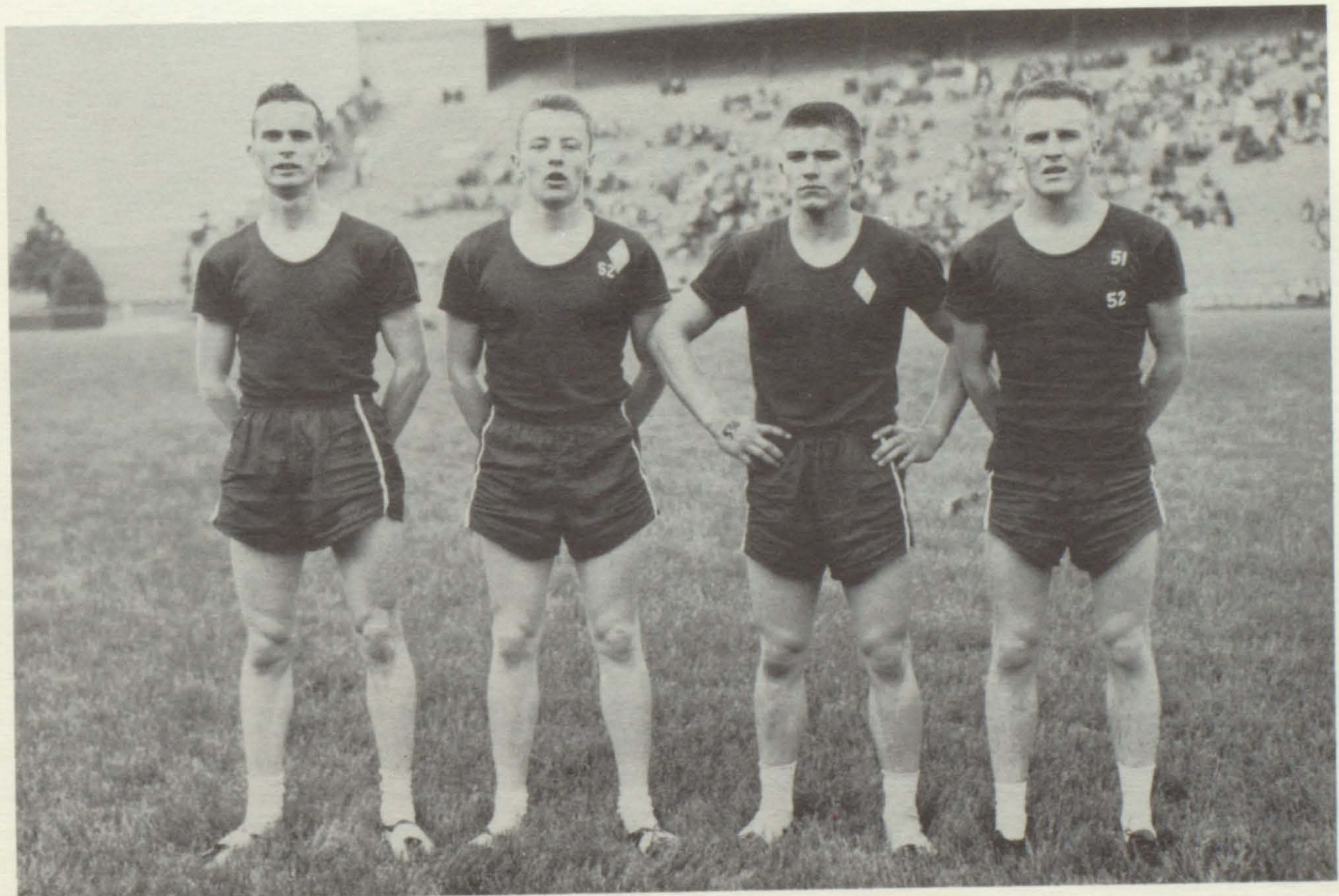

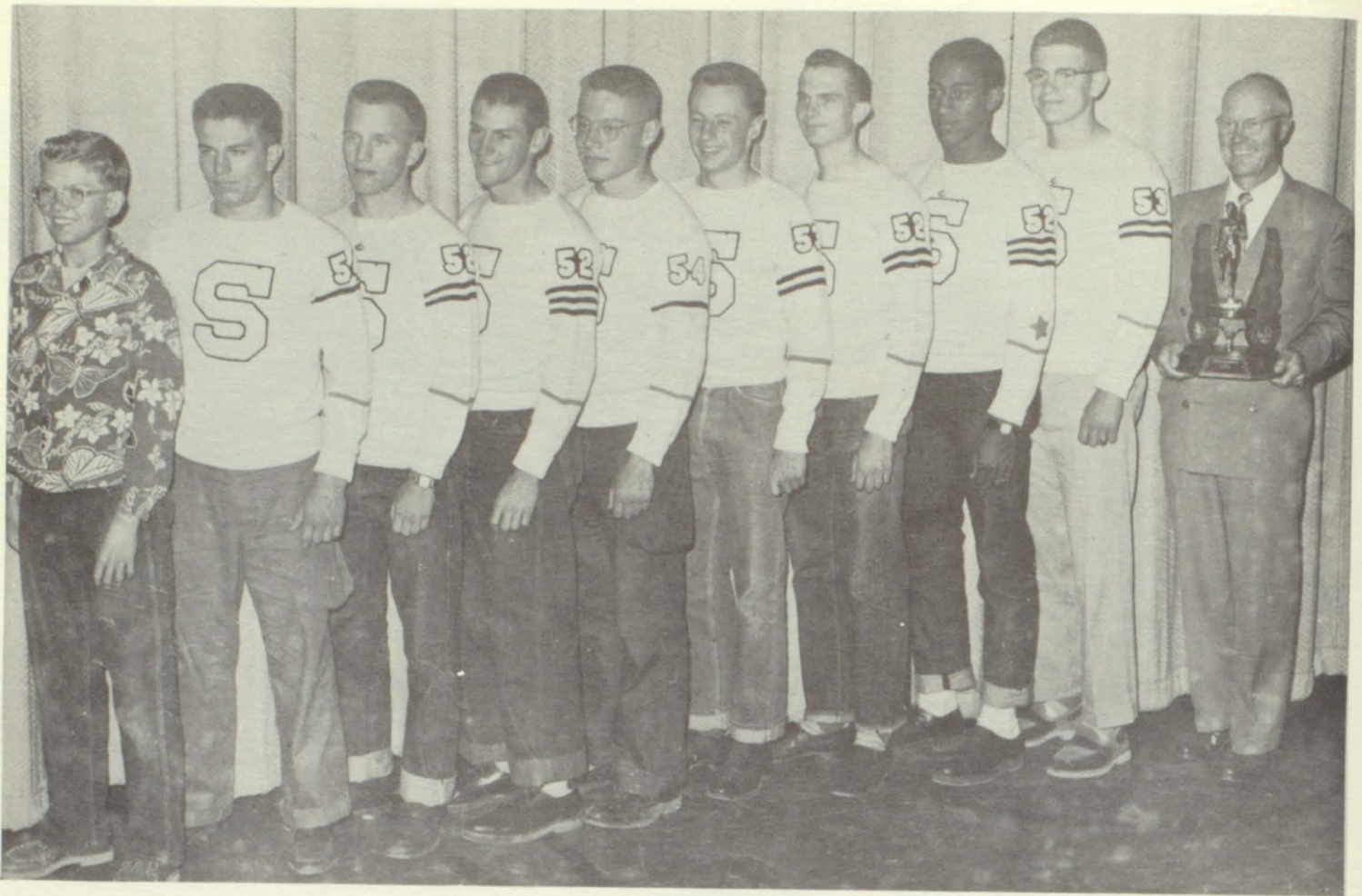

In the Western Nebraska meet held at Scottsbluff there were nineteen schools represented, with Sidney placing second with 33½ points.

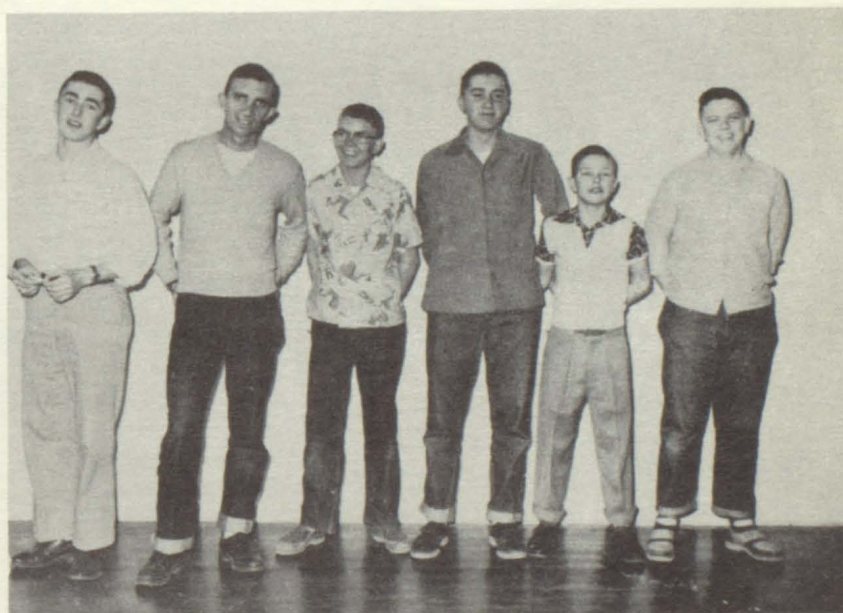

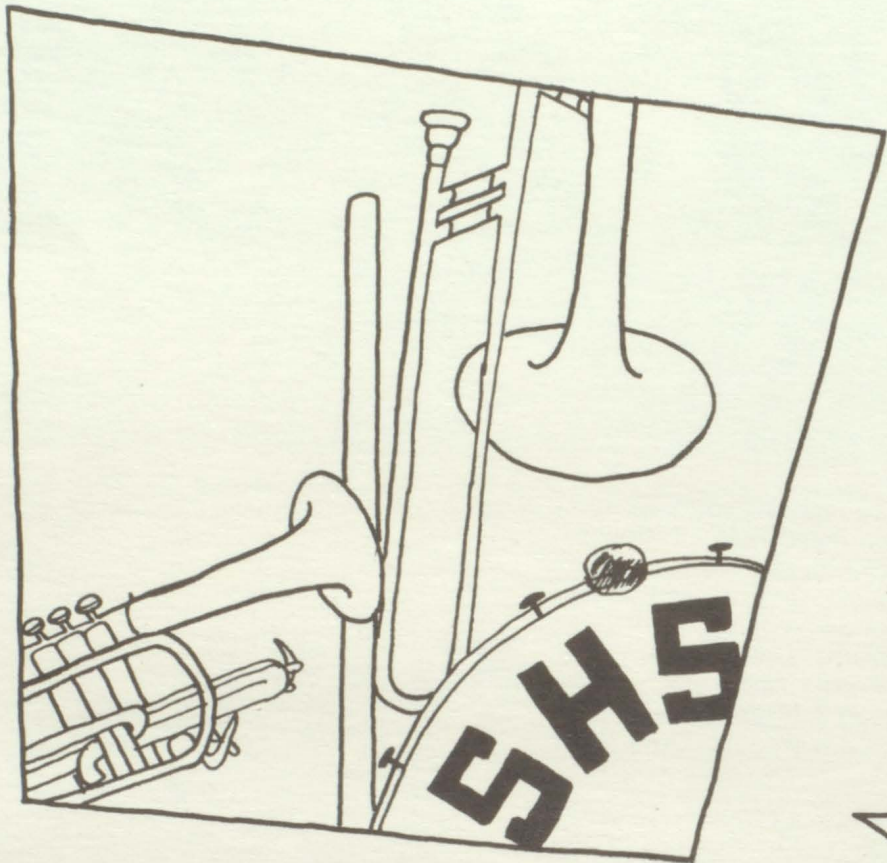

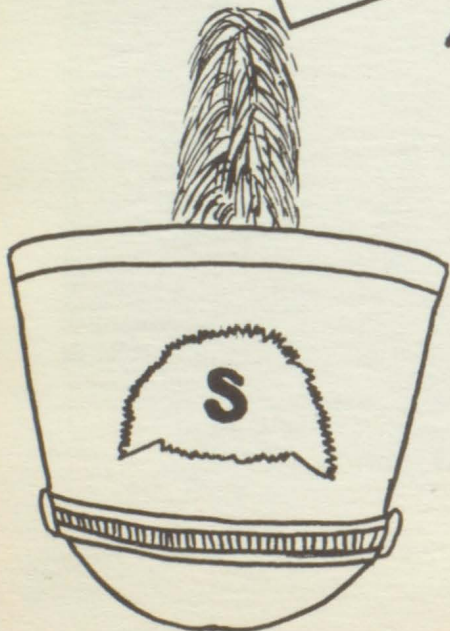
